Inspiration from old and new friends at the Resident University 2006

For three days, Birmingham was the capital city of European citizens. Over 325 active residents from 6 different countries attended the Resident University at the University of Birmingham. People could meet up and exchange experiences at the excursions and workshops or at the market-square where most resident groups presented their materials. Birmingham was a warm and inspiring setting for meeting up with old and new friends from all over Europe.

The Lord Mayor of Birmingham opened the University on Wednesday evening at the Brasshouse Pub. It was a great night to get into the right atmosphere.



On Thursday, the university was opened by chair of the day Matt Lane with an discussion about the theme 'Big City, Small Neighbourhoods, One Vision! Naseem Akthar (Balsall Heath forum) opened the discussion and residents from different places took a seat in the living room on stage to talk about their neighbourhoods and vision. The history professor and great performer Carl Chinn paved the way for an interesting look at Birmingham. The pouring rain couldn't stop people for going to the excursions in different parts of Birmingham. But happily the rain transformed into a pale sun after a few hours. At the end of the afternoon, when





people came back, they could talk about (and paint!) the impressions of the day.



On Friday the event was hosted by Masood Yasin, a resident of Birmingham, and started with an interesting speech of Joe Montgomery, the head of the National Neighbourhood Renewal Unit (RNU) in England. This was an perfect introduction for the workshops that were being held afterwards. Take a look at the button 'key messages workshops' to get an understanding of what was being said on that sunny Friday afternoon.

After a look into the future, where Douwe Wielenga presented the plans of R4R for the next months, Councillor Jim Whorwood officially closed The Resident University, but not before the paintings were being offered to representatives of the different countries present: Belgium, Germany, Lithuania, Bulgaria, The Netherlands and the UK. The Dutch painting was given to Jannie Lispet and will be presented at the European Residents Centre in The Hague.

Key messages workshops

Youth and Education

It takes a whole neighbourhood to raise a child.

- 1. Formative experience of children: taught or gained.
- 2. Whole family and community is responsible for teaching. Not just role of teachers, social workers etc.
- 3. Skill set to engage with society: formal (if lacking: how to tackle regeneration) and informal.

Ethnic Diversity and Neighbourhoods

- 1. Don't lose sight of the common issues.
- 2. Role of facilitators for new migrants is very important: who to contact? What are the short-cuts through the system? What are the 'rules' of the neighbourhood?
- 3. People's housing choices are complicated and needs can get lost at a level of service provision (travel, proximity to places of worship, amenities etc.). It is hard for individuals to be the pioneers: are there imaginative solutions for this? This is an important issue for tackling ethnic segregation.

Safe and Clean Neighbourhoods

- 1. Problems are the same across all the countries, but there are also differences.
 - You need to establish what the real problems are:

Anti-social behaviour

Gangs

Individual responsibility

Problems of cars and traffic, Etc.

- 2. The responsibilities will have to be identified: whose is responsible for what?
- 3. Try to change behaviour through education
- 4. Enforce accountability of service providers.
- 5. Make landlords more responsible

Resident Led Neighbourhood Management

1. Be realistic about what you can do: start small work towards larger goals.

- 2. Check who controls the resources? Community control of budget is different than local government controlled.
- 3. Neighbourhood diversity = neighbourhood health.
- 4. Education is keyword.
 - Residents need skills, such as public speaking, to communicate needs,
 - Service providers need training in how to work with residents.

Creativity and tactics

- Convince officials and 'funders' that they want to give you money for your ideas. Use networks, petitions, contacts, door-to-door and NEVER GIVE UP!
- 2. Play Politics. Find out what is 'hot' in policy, then translate this into fitting your aim.

Hard to reach

- No-one is hard to reach if you use the right approach. Nobody has to fall into the 'hard-toreach' group if there is the will and communication to involve people.
- 2. Woman are the key to successful communication.
- 3. Negativity is just a way of thinking: we need more positive messages.

Voice, represantation and neighbourhood

- 1. Engage with young people
- 2. Persistance
- 3. Build alliances

Partnerships between local government and resident led Neighbourhood Management

- 1. Take a risk: let everyone win and dare to get it wrong
- 2. Devolve or cooperate: service specific local decisions compromised by central government.
- 3. There must be a clarity of purpose, maybe joint training of local officers and residents?
